NOTE: SHOW Slide 2 (Identifications and Wear of Army Uniform)

a. Purposes and history of the military uniforms

(1) To provide a means by which units might readily be identified in action or on the march

(2) A means by which rank could be distinguished

(3) To foster pride of service and esprit de corps. The uniform in America is based on European tradition. Some of the history behind it is as follows:

(4) The idea of camouflaged uniforms began in the American Revolutionary War with homespun brown deerskins. But, continental soldiers wore uniforms patterned after the British. Not until World War I did the U.S. Army begin to wear uniforms designed to blend with the terrain and vegetation.

(5) Until World War I, the "dress-up" uniform and the "work" uniform were one and the same. This created obvious problems in camouflage, suitability on the battlefield, ease of cleaning, etc.

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(6) Today, the dress uniforms preserve the traditional values of the past by retaining some of the colors and ornamentation of former times. However, the work uniform is designed for use on the battlefield and makes no effort to be distinctive except in insignia

NOTE: SHOW Slide 2 (Identifications and wear of Army Uniform)

NOTE: Drill Sergeants should use actual uniforms for this portion of the class when possible

b. Utility Uniform: Army Combat Uniform (ACU)

(1) Occasions for wear:

(a) *All purpose wear*. Some versions of the combat uniform are not intended for wear as an allpurpose uniform. The combat uniform is designed to be worn under body armor.

(b) *Approved wear*. The combat uniform is prescribed for year-round wear for all Soldiers, unless directed by the Commander. Soldiers may wear the combat uniform off-post, unless prohibited by the Commander.

(2) Restrictions on wear:

(a) Soldiers may not wear the combat uniform for commercial travel unless authorized IAW para 3-7b through c of AR 670-1.

(b) Personnel may not wear the combat uniform in off-post establishments that primarily sell alcohol for consumption on the premises. If the establishment sell alcohol and food for consumption on the premises, Soldiers may not wear the combat uniform if their activities in the establishment center on the drinking of alcohol

NOTE: Cover local SOP/policy for wearing of ACU off-post

NOTE: SHOW Slide 3 (Army Combat Uniform)

c. Wearing guidelines:

(1) Patrol cap

(a) Straight on the head so that the cap band creates a straight line around the head, parallel to the ground.

(b) The cap will fit snugly and comfortably around the largest part of the head without bulging or distortion from the intended shape of the headgear and without excessive gaps.

(c) No rolling of, blocking, or alterations to the cap are authorized.

(d) The cap is worn so that no hair is visable on the forehead beneath the cap.

(e) The nametap will be worn centered on the hook-and-loop pads on the back of the patrol cap.

(f) Soldiers may sew on the nametap and/or grade insignia as an option. Hook-and-loop fasteners for the nametape may be left on or removed when sewing it on to the patrol cap.

(g) If Soldiers choose to sew on the name tape or grade insignia, it will be at their own expense.

NOTE: SHOW Slide 3 (Army Combat Uniform)

(2) Beret

(a) The beret is worn so that the headband (edge binding) is straight across the forehead, 1 inch above the eyebrows.

(b) The flash is positioned over the left eye. The excess material is draped over the right ear; extending to at least the top of the ear, and no lower than the middle of the ear.

(c) Personnel will cut off the ends of the adjusting ribbon and secure the ribbon knot inside the edge binding at the back of the beret.

(d) When worn properly, the beret is formed to the shape of the head; therefore, Soldiers may not wear hairstyles that cause distortion of the intended shape of the beret.

(e) The beret is equipped with a stiffener on the left front for attaching organizational flashes and insignia.

NOTE: SHOW Slide 4 (Army Combat Uniform)

(3) Coat (Description)

(a) Mandarin collar will normally be worn in the down position. Soldiers are authorized to wear the madarin collar in the up position when wearing body armor or when weather conditions dictate the wear, as prescribed by the commander

(b) Universal pattern, with hook fastener-backed U.S. Army, last name tape and rank insignia over the breastbone

(c) Zippered front closure, reinforced with hook and loop fasteners

(d) Loop fastener-faced shoulder pockets for unit patches, skill tabs, and recognition devices. Permanent infrared (IR) Identification friend or foe (IFF) squares are sewn to each shoulder for nighttime identification

(e) Tilted chest pockets with hook-and-loop closure

(f) Hook-and-loop cuff closures

(g) Three-slot pen pocket on the left arm

(h) Elbow pouches for elbow pad inserts

NOTE: SHOW Slide 4 (Army Combat Uniform)

(4) Coat (Wearing Guidelines)

(a) Loose fitting

(b) Alterations to make the uniform form fitting are not authorized

(c) Coat is normally worn outside the trousers, and the trousers are worn with a belt. The coat may also be worn inside the trouser when directed by the Commander

(d) Blouse bellows for increased mobility

(e) Sleeves worn down at all times (not rolled or cuffed)

(f) Coat will not extend below the top of the cargo pocket on the trousers, and will not be higher than the bottom of the opening of the side pocket on the trousers

NOTE: SHOW Slide 4 (Army Combat Uniform)

(5) Trousers (Description)

(a) Universal pattern

(b) Two forward-tilted thigh storage pockets with elastic drawstring and hook-and-loop tape for closure during movement

(c) Two calf storage pockets with hook-and-loop closure, one on each leg; the pockets are bellowsed

(d) Four standard type pockets and two leg bellow type pockets

NOTE: Show Slide 4 (Army Combat Uniform)

(6) Trouser (Wearing Guidelines)

(a) Loose fitting

(b) Alterations to make the uniform form fitting are not authorized

(c) Trousers will be worn tucked into the top of the boots or bloused using the draw string at the bottom of the trousers or commercial blousing devices

(d) When bloused, the trousers should not extend below the third eyelet from the top of the boot

NOTE: SHOW Slide 5 (Army Combat Uniform)

(7) Insignias

(a) Grade:

-1- Subdued metal pin-on grade insignia is identical to the non-subdued pin-on grade insignia, except the insignia has a dull, flat black finish.

-2- All enlisted personnel will wear subdued grade insignia on utility uniforms, the cold weather coat, and on the ECWCS (Gore-Tex) Parka. On the utility uniforms, the subdued grade insignia is worn centered on the hook-and-loop face pad. On the ECWCS parka, the subdued insignia is worn centered on the front tab of the parka.

NOTE: SHOW Slide 5 (Army Combat Uniform)

(8) Shoulder sleeve insignia (SSI) subdued patches and tab:

(a) Velcro patch of individuals current organization

(b) All personnel will wear the subdued SSI centered both vertically and horizontally on the hookand-loop-faced pad already provided on the left sleeve of the utility uniforms or field jacket

(c) A maximum of three (3) skill tabs may be worn at a time and placed directly on top of the hook and loop-face pad worn on the left shoulder pocket flap. Authorized skill tabs do not include tabs that are part of unit organizational patch such as airborne or mountain tabs.

(d) SSI-former wartime service (FWTS): Personnel may wear the subdued SSI-FWTS patch on the right sleeve centered both vertically and horizontally from the bottom of the pocket flap to the

bottom of the pocket on the hook-and-loop-face pad already provided on the utility uniforms or field jacket. SSI-FWTS is worn at the option of the wearer

(e) The U.S. Flag insignia (Full Color or Subdued) is worn on the right shoulder flap of utility uniforms and cold-weather jackets. The flag insignia is placed directly on top of the hook-and-loopfaced-pad already provided on the uniforms shoulder pocket flap. All Soldiers will wear the full-color U.S. flag embroidered insignia on the utility and organizational uniforms, unless deployed or in a field environment. Soldiers will wear the subdued tactical flag insignia while deployed or in a field environment.

NOTE: SHOW Slide 5 (Army Combat Uniform)

(10) Special skill and Identification badges:

(a) Subdued: Badges may all be either sew-on or pin-on

(b) Wear up to five badges above the U.S. Army so long as space allows for the badges on the individual's uniform

(c) All skill badges will be worn above the U.S. Army tape

(d) When one badge is worn, it is centered 1/8 inch above the U.S. Army Tape

(e) When two to three badges are worn, they are centered 1/8 inch above the U.S. Army tape, and worn vertically with 1/4 inch between badges

(f) When four badges are worn, they are centered 1/8 inch above the U.S. Army tape, and worn vertically and side-by-side in stacks of two with 1/4 inch between badges vertically and 1/2 inch between badges horizontally

(g) When Five badges are worn, they are worn the same as four badges above with the addition the badge centered 1/4 inch above the top two badges

(h) A maximum of two (2) pin on Identification badges may be worn centered on each breast pocket

(11) Composition

(a) Coat

(b) Trousers

(c) Undershirt, Tan

(d) Undergarments

- (e) Belt, sand rigger
- (f) Socks, tan,green, or black; cushion sole
- (g) Boots, combat, tan leather
- (h) Headgear
- NOTE: SHOWSlide 6 (Army Combat Uniform)
- (12) Accessories
- (a) Gloves
- (b) Coat, cold-weather (field jacket)
- (c) Trousers, wet weather, camouflage
- (d) Handbags (female only)

NOTE: Show Slide- 7 Physical Fitness Uniform (PFU)

Uniform: Army Physical Fitness Uniform (APFU)

- a) The APFU consists of the following components
- (1) Jacket, running, black and gold, with gold Army logo
- (2) Pants, running, black, with gold Army logo
- (3) Trunks, running, black, with "Army" in gold
- (4) T-shirt, black, short sleeved, with "Army" in gold
- (5) T-shirt, black, long sleeved, with "Army" in gold
- (6) Footwear
- (7) Socks
- b) Accessories
- (1) Gloves
- (2) Fleece cap, black or coyote brown

c) Occasions for wear

(1) The IPFU is authorized for wear on and off duty, on and off the installation, unless restricted by the commander. Soldiers may wear all or part of the IPFU with civilian attire off the installation, unless restricted by the commander. The IPFU is not intended for wear as an all-purpose

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uniform when other uniforms are more appropriate.

d) Insignia

(1) The only insignia authorized for wear on the APFU is the physical fitness badge. When the physical fitness badge is worn, it is sewn on the upper left front side of the APFU T-shirt above the word "Army". On the APFU running jacket, the insignia is sewn centered and ½ inch above the word "Army." See AR 600-8-22 for criteria for wearing the physical fitness badge.

e) General guidelines

(1) When Soldiers wear the APFU as a complete uniform, they will keep the sleeves down on the jacket, the legs down on the pants, and they will tuck the T-shirt inside the trunks. Soldiers may not cuff the PFU jacket sleeves. Soldiers will wear the microfleece cap pulled down snugly on the head with the bottom edge covering the ears, but not covering the eyebrows. The bottom edge (all) of the cap may be folded, but not rolled.

NOTE: See DA PAM 670-1, Chapter 10-6 for additional guidance

NOTE: SHOW Slide 8 (Dress Uniforms)

f. Army Green Service (AGSU) and Dress variations -

Note: The occasions/restrictions on wear of the service uniform apply to both genders

(1) Occasions for wear:

(a) On and off duty, on and off the installation, unless restricted by the Commander. The class A and dress uniform is not intended for wear as an all-purpose uniform when other uniforms are more appropriate. The AGSU is prescribed for year round wear for all Soldiers, unless otherwise directed by the commanded. Soldiers may wear variations of the ASGU.

(b) On duty when prescribed by the commander; at social functions of a private or official nature, either before or after retreat, and while in transit to and from such functions. The AGSU is normally considered appropriate for social or official functions off the installation, such as memorial services, funerals, weddings, inaugurals, patriotic ceremonies, and similar functions.

(c) When designated by the host of an event

(d) On other appropriate occasions, as desired by the individual

(2) Restrictions on wear

(a) Personnel may not wear the AGSU uniform in off-post establishments that primarily sell alcohol. If the off-post establishment sells alcohol and food, Soldiers may not wear the uniform if the their activities in the establishment center on the drinking of alcohol.

(b) Commanders may further restrict wear of the AGSU per paragraph 2-6c, 2-7a, and 2-7b of AR 670-1.

(3) Composition- The AGSU consists of the following:

- (a) Coat
- (b) Slacks
- (c) Skirt (optional for females).
- (d) Shirt
- (e) Necktie
- (f) Undergarments

NOTE: Show Slide 9

- (g) Belt
- (h) Headgear
- (i) Footwear

(j) Socks

NOTE: Show Slide 10

- (4) The AGSU has multiple veriations:
- (a) Class A AGSU: All components are worn
- (b) Class B AGSU: The coat is not worn; the neck tie is optional if the short-sleeve shirt is worn

(c) Dress AGSU: All components are worn; All Soldiers will wear the heritage green four-in-hand necktie after retreat. When the AGSU is worn for evening social occasions (after retreat), headgear is not required. Combat boots and organizational items, such as brassards and military police accessories, are not authorized for wear with the dress AGSU.

NOTE: SHOW Slide 11 (Identifications and wear of Military Uniform)

h. Clothing Maintenance Allowance

Note: During the first year of duty, Soldiers receive one-half of their clothing allowance because they have the ability to Direct Exchange (DX) equipment for the first six months of active duty

(1) Given to offset the cost of cleaning, repairing, and replacement of uniforms

- (2) Begin to accrue a clothing allowance after being on active duty for six months (see note)
- (3) Paid once a year on the anniversary of your enlistment
- (4) Identified in your Leave and Earnings Statement (LES)
- NOTE: SHOW Slide 11 (Identifications and wear of Military Uniform)

i. Care and Maintenance of Army Uniforms

(1) Army green/green classic service uniform

(a) Recommend dry cleaning of the jacket and trousers/skirt and slacks

- (b) Sleeves and lapels will be rolled pressed without creasing
- (c) Trousers/slacks will be creased, skirts will not
- (d) Sleeves of shirts/blouses will be creased

(e) Permanent press finish may require some pressing to maintain a neat military appearance; however, before pressing Soldier should read and comply with care instructions attached to uniform items.

(2) Army Combat Uniform (ACU):

(a) Do not starch the combat uniform under any circumstances. Using starch, sizing, and any process that involves dry cleaning or steam press will adversely affect the treatments durability of the uniform is not authorized.

(b) Wash the combat uniform in cold water and mild detergent containing no optical brighteners or bleach.

(c) Tumble dry the combat uniform at low heat (not to exceed 130 degrees fahrenheit). Remove immediatly from the dryer and fold flat or place on a rustproof hanger to ensure heat from the dryer does not set wrinkles. To drip dry, remove from the washer and place on a rustproof hanger. Do not wring or twist.

(d) Soldiers may roll press uniforms, as necessary.
