DEFINE ORDER



Order: A communication, written, oral or by signal, which conveys instruction from a superior to a subordinate.

In a broad sense, the terms "order" and "command" are synonymous. However, an order implies discretion as to the details of execution, whereas a command does not.



TWO TYPES OF ORDERS



- Administrative Orders: Cover normal administrative operations in garrison or in the field. They include general, specific, and memorandum orders; courts-martial orders; bulletins, circulars and other memoranda.
- Combat Orders: Pertain to strategic, operational, or tactical operations and their service support.



FIVE COMBAT ORDERS



- 1. OPERATION ORDERS (OPORDs)
- 2. SERVICE SUPPORT ORDERS
- 3. MOVEMENT ORDERS
- 4. WARNING ORDERS (WARNOS)
- 5. FRAGMENTARY ORDERS (FRAGOs)



WARNING ORDER (WARNO)



- The Warning Order is a preliminary notice of an order or action, which is to follow.
- WARNOs maximize subordinates planning time, provide essential details of the impending operation, and detail events that accompany preparation and execution.
- Does not authorize execution other than planning unless specifically stated.
- Maps, enemy situation, higher mission, commanders intent (if available), recon & surveillance orders, planning considerations.



MOVEMENT ORDER



- A Movement Order is an order issued by a commander covering the details for a move of the command.
- Usually concerns administrative moves that normally occur in the communications area or rear areas.



OPERATION ORDER (OPORD)



Operation Order: A directive issued by a commander to subordinate commanders for the purpose of effecting the coordinated execution of an operation.

Contains as a minimum, descriptions of the following:

- Task organization
- Situation
- Mission
- Execution
- Sustainment
- Command and Control.

OPORDs always specify an execution date and time.



FRAGEMENTARY ORDER (FRAGO)



- Fragmentary Order: An abbreviated form of an operation order (verbal, written, or digital) usually issued on a day-to-day basis that eliminates the need for restating information contained in a basic operation order.
- Address only those parts of the original OPORD that have changed.
- Commanders may authorize members of their staff to issue FRAGOs in their name.



SERVICE SUPPORT ORDERS



- Service Support Order: An order that directs the service and support of operations, including administrative movements.
- Provides information to support elements and serves as a basis for the orders of supporting missions. Service and Support orders may be issued with an OPORD.



OPERATION ORDER Essential Elements



- Task Organization
- Terrain Analysis

- 1. Situation
- 2. Mission
- 3. Execution
- 4. Sustainment
- 5. Command and Control



OPERATION ORDER



Task organization

- 1. Always given before the situation paragraph. This lets subordinates know what assets they have for the mission.
- 2. Two formats...outlined and matrix. Sequence is the same for both methods.



TERRAIN ANALYSIS



Neither ADP 5-0, ATP 3-21.10 specifically requires a terrain analysis paragraph in a written operation order; but both manuals emphasize the need to conduct a terrain analysis and then communicate the results of that analysis to subordinates by writing a brief synopsis of the terrain, using OCOKA or OAKOC depending on which reference you are using as guide.



SITUATION



Enemy Forces

- 1. Disposition, Composition, and Strength.
- 2. Capabilities.
- 3. Most probable course of action (COA).
- 4. Most dangerous course of action (COA).

Friendly Forces

- 1. Higher units. A verbatim statement of the higher unit Commander's Mission Statement from paragraph 2 and the concept of the operation statement from paragraph 3a.
- 2. State the missions of flank units and other units whose actions effect your unit.



SITUATION



Environment

- Terrain. Critical terrain that impacts mission.
- Weather. Critical weather that impacts mission.
- Civil Considerations. Critical civil impacts.

Attachments Detachments

- 1. Do not repeat information already listed under Task Organization or in the annex A (Task Organization).
- 2. Otherwise list units attached or detached to the headquarters that issues the order.
- 3. State when attachment or detachment is effective.



MISSION



- Mission Statement: A short sentence or paragraph describing the unit's essential task (or tasks).
- The purpose clearly indicates the action to be taken and the reason for doing so.
- It contains the elements of who, what, when, where, and why, and the reasons thereof, but seldom specifies how.



EXECUTION



A. Concept of Operations COMMANDERS INTENT: The stated VISION that defines the purpose of the operation and the relationship among the force, the enemy and the terrain.

- The Commander's expected end state of the mission.
- The result the Commander expects the unit to accomplish in a specific operation.
- At a minimum, must include scheme of maneuver and concept of fires.



EXECUTIONConcept of Operations Cont.



- 1. Maneuver: State the scheme of maneuver. Must address decisive and shaping operations.
- Do not duplicate info in unit subparagraphs and coordinating instructions.
- 2. Fires: Describe the scheme of fires.
- Address priority of fires, changes, priority targets, who controls them and any restrictions.
 - Air Support: CAS allocation.
 - Field Artillery: CMD relationship and priorities.
 - Naval gunfire support.
 - Fire support coordinating measures.



EXECUTIONConcept of Operations Cont.



3. Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance:Outline ISR concept and how it ties in with the scheme of maneuver.

- 4. Intelligence
- 5. Engineer
- 6. Air and Missile Defense
- 7. Information Operations
- 8. NBC Operations
- 9. Military Police Operations
- 10. Civil-Military Operations



EXECUTIONScheme of maneuver



- **B. Task to Maneuver Units:** State the missions or tasks assigned to each maneuver unit that reports directly to the headquarters issuing the order. Every task must include a purpose that links it to the concept of operations. Use a separate subparagraph for each unit.
- C. Tasks to Combat and Combat Support Units: State the missions or tasks assigned to non maneuver combat units and CS units. Cross-reference attachments that assign them tasks. Use a separate subparagraph for each unit.



EXECUTION



- **D. Coordinating Instructions:** List only instructions applicable to two or more units and not covered in unit SOPs.
 - 1. Time or condition when a plan or an order becomes effective.
 - 2. Commander's critical information requirements. May include PIR, EEFI and or FFIR.
 - 3. Risk reduction control measures.
 - 4. Rules of engagement (ROE).
 - 5. Environmental considerations.
 - 6. Force protection.
 - 7. Any additional coordinating instructions.



SUSTAINMENT



Address sustainment as needed to clarify the service support concept.

Refer to annexes, if required.

Subparagraphs include:

- Support concept
- Materiel and Services
- Health Service support
- Personnel Service support.
- Support Concept. State the concept of logistics support to provide non-CSS commanders and their staffs a visualization of how the operation will be logistically supported.



SUSTAINMENT Continued



- 1. Supply
 - Info on all classes of supply (Class I-IX)
 - Constraints and limitations
- 2. Transportation INFILL / EXFILL
- 3. Services SUPPORT GROUP
- 4. Maintenance PLAN
- **5. Medical Evacuation** PLAN, medical details specific to the organization.
- **6. Personnel:** Identify the EPW collection points and handling of EPW's.
- 7. **Miscellaneous:** Destruction of supplies and anything not covered elsewhere.



COMMAND AND CONTROL



A. Command:

- 1. Location of higher CMD, and CP
- 2. Location of platoon leader or CP
- 3. Location of PSG or alternate CP
- 4. Succession of command

B. SIGNAL:

- 1. ANCD/SOI INDEX in effect
- 2. Listening / silence
- 3. Method of communication internal
 - A. Visual / Radio
 - B. Primary / Alternate
 - C. Day / Night

Code words: challenge and pass, call-signs, number combinations



FINAL CONSIDERATIONS



- At completion of the order or if the order is complex ask for any questions at the end of each stage
- Ask questions of subordinates and designate time for back brief
- Synchronize watches and timings
